#26 – "When Sea Billows Wail, It is Still Well with My Soul"
Luke 8:22-25

- I. Introduction.
 - A. The perfect storm
 - 1. Pastor Don & Diedre far away pastoral call to Wisconsin.
 - a. High seas and the badger.
 - B. Today's text.
 - 1. Sea of Galilee It can be a place of peril.
- II. Exposition
 - A. Luke 8:22-23
 - 1. Turbulence of this sea Leon Morris.
 - 2. Many of the disciples were professional fishermen. Yet, they had not experienced this type of storm Matt. 8:24.
 - 3. "They began to be swamped."
 - a. When bailing has no affect.
 - B. Luke 8:24
 - 1. Jesus asleep.
 - 2. Did the disciples remember? Ps 69:1,15; Jonah 2:3
 - 3. Discrepancies in the gospel reporting of this event are not a reason for an attack on inerrancy.
 - a. There was great confusion among the disciples.
 - 4. Did they remember Jesus power to control the fish? Psalm 65:5-7; 89:9

- 5. He rebuked the wind and the sea became calm.
 - a. The wind <u>and</u> the water became calm a miracle to be sure Mark 4:39.

C. Luke 8:25

- 1. "Where is your faith?"
 - a. Also Luke 12:28; Matthew 6:30; 14:31; 16:8; 17:20
- 2. They had seen Him do miracles in the past but this is the first time that the miracle involved life and death for them.
 - a. Contrast with Paul Acts 27:14-44; I Cor. 11:22-23
 - b. Kent Hughes
- 3. The disciples forgot who really was in the boat with them.
- 4. They were fearful and wondered "who is this who commands the winds and water and they obey Him?"
 - a. Mark 4:41
 - b. An encounter with the Holy.
 - c. R. C. Sproul on the trauma of holiness.

III. Points for Reflection

- A. We all know similar turbulent waters as those of the Sea of Galilee because of oceans of personal anxiety.
- B. When faced with the swamping over from anxiety, go to Jesus.
- C. Going to Jesus means going to the Word through prayer while looking to the church for wisdom, admonishment, and comfort.
- D. Here are three reasons to trust God when faced with stormy gales.
- E. An encounter with the holiness of God always reminds us to lift our eyes upward.
