Insights from Luke

#51 – “When the Trumpet of God Blows, People Are Called to Listen” – Luke 13:1-9

I. Introduction

A. The blowing of trumpets.

1. Rev. 8:1, 2, 8-12; 9:20-21
2. Calls to repentance
3. Catastrophes – Titanic, 9/11
4. Cathedral service on the nation mourned 9/11
 - a. Distortion of Luther’s Hymn “A Mighty Fortress Is Our God”.
 - b. Church attendance increased briefly, but quickly receded as the nation continued to slip into progressive secularism.
 - c. When the trumpet is not heeded, the spiritual destruction increases.

B. The stage is set for Jesus’ words about repentance.

1. Luke 13:1-9

II. Exposition

A. Luke 13:1

1. First of two forms of evil.
2. Galileans were known for being independent.
3. Pilate was known for brutality.

B. Luke 13:2-3

1. Wrong impression – a tragic death meant a life as a worse sinner.
2. “No,” verse 3. In the emphatic position.
 - a. Herod judged – Acts 12:21-23

1. Job counseled with the same wrong impressions.

a. Job 4:7.

3. Galileans were not worse sinners. Everyone is under God’s judgment.

4. Jesus may be referring to AD 70.

C. Luke 13:4-5

1. Nothing is known about this tower.
2. The hearers were in no better place.
3. “Perish” – not a reference to death in this life, but rather to the final judgment in the next life.
4. Repentance means a change of mind and change in our W_____.
5. Jesus has been warning all along. Luke 12:40, 37-38, 46, 48, 57-59; 13:3, 5.

D. Luke 13:6-7

1. The famous parable.
2. Waiting does come to an end. Fruit is the goal.

E. Luke 13:8-9

1. A stay of execution. The patience of God is in view.
 - a. II Peter 3:9

III. Points for Reflection.

- A. God is sovereign over evil.
- B. Calamity of any magnitude is always a reminder to pause and review your spiritual life.
- C. The real tragedy in life is not the deaths reported in the headlines but rather that we are all going to die.
- D. Repentance always means a change of thinking which results in a changed life.
- E. God expects the tree of our life to produce fruit.
