  - a. Fasting
  - b. Tithing

  - 1. A passionate prayer asking for mercy
    - a. Three parts of the prayer
      - 1. God
      - 2. Sinner
      - 3. Mercy
- E. Luke 18:14
  - 1. He was justified counted as righteous

  - A. Our own merits are never enough when laid before God's judgment seat.
  - B. The longer we live in Christ, the more we should experience the simplicity of our walk with God.
  - C. Humility in spirit is the true reflection of our lowly estate.
